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### FINANCIAL SUMMARY 2019/20

The **Council Precept** is the main source of Council income and represents the amount of council tax paid by households in Carmarthen that is allocated to the Town Council. The annual precept (£133.10 per Band D household) raised a total of £727,617.75 for the Town Council during 2019/20 (the Town Council does not receive anything from business rates). It also received other income of £185,435 mainly from the provision of its services (e.g. Carmarthen Cemetery, purchases from Carmarthen Park Tea Shop, hire of the velodrome and rugby pitch) and external grants.

The Council retains **reserves** of £100,000 to deal with unforeseen contingencies and emergencies.

Expenditure on **capital projects** during 2019/20 was significantly above the average, with several planned capital projects being completed during the year. These included:

- Development of play area and equipment in Carmarthen Park - £100,000
- Enhancement of the electricity supply capacity at Carmarthen Park - £38,000
- Purchase of new tractor for the Grounds Maintenance Team - £32,000
- Procurement of chairlift for St Peter's Civic Hall - £16,000

## Reflection and Looking Forward

An opportunity to reflect on how things are going and outline future priorities.

What has worked well for the Council?	Several long-standing capital projects have been completed during the year, including a substantial investment in play equipment for children and young people at Carmarthen Park.
What have been the barriers for the Council?	In March 2020 the focus of the Town Council's work shifted dramatically towards supporting vulnerable people during the coronavirus pandemic. A range of initiatives and projects were very quickly initiated, including an initial focus on supporting local vulnerable people directly by the creation of a volunteer support scheme - 'Carmarthen Community Care'. This work is continuing and has been followed more recently by phase 2, where the Town Council has been leading work with stakeholders on the Carmarthen Town Recovery Plan in an effort to restore economic normality as soon as possible. This work will be reported upon in more detail in 2021.
Are there any matters the PSB could support delivery/progress on?	To continue to facilitate joint working and the sharing of good practice between members.
What are the Council's main priorities looking forward to 2020-21?	The Council will seek to increase its level of engagement with the local community and focus on its use of digital technology to achieve key objectives. It will also seek to progress the transfer of certain maintenance responsibilities within the town centre from the County Council.

This makes recommendations to the Town Council on these matters.
